Caesarean section wound care management training

Your wound (area cut for the caesarean section) will be covered with a waterproof dressing which allows the midwife to see your wound so an assessment can be made. The midwife will give you advice about removing the dressing on day 7 after your caesarean section.

Information About Your Caesarean Section Before And After ...

A caesarean section, or C-section, is an operation to deliver your baby through a cut made in your tummy and womb. The cut is usually made across your tummy, just below your bikini line. A caesarean is a major operation that carries a number of risks, so it's usually only done if it's the safest option for you and your baby.

gently clean and dry the wound every day wear loose, comfortable clothes and cotton underwear take a painkiller if the wound is sore - for most women, it's better to take paracetamol or ibuprofen (but not aspirin) while you're breastfeeding

Care of the woman after caesarean section - Caesarean ...

A cesarean (se-ZAYR-ee-an) section is one way that a baby can be delivered. Caregivers will do this surgery when you cannot have your baby through your vagina. Caregivers make an incision (cut) in your lower abdomen (belly) and into the uterus (womb). The baby is delivered through this incision.

To soothe incision soreness, your health care provider might recommend ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin IB, others), acetaminophen (Tylenol, others) or other medications to relieve pain. Most pain relief medications are safe for breast-feeding women. Look for signs of infection Check your C-section incision for signs of infection.

C-Section Scars: Types of Incisions, Healing, Treatment ...

Your wound will continue to feel sore and bruised for a few weeks and you will need to take pain relief for at least 7-10 days after your c-section, so you may want to make sure you have some paracetamol and ibuprofen at home. To help control the pain take your pain relief regularly and on time, even if you don't have pain at the moment.

The layers of muscle, fat and skin will be stitched back together and a dressing will be applied over the wound. After a caesarean section. A number of things will occur after you have a caesarean section, including: You will be cared for in the recovery room until you are ready to go to the ward.

A Caesarean section is a major operation. It will take some time for you to return to normal. The outside skin edges of your wound should seal after about two days but the internal healing of muscle and other tissue below the surface goes on for many months. After your operation you may expect:

Caring for your wound after a Caesarean section

Incision Care If you go home with a dressing (bandage), change the dressing over your cut once a day, or sooner if it gets dirty or wet. Your provider will tell you when to stop keeping your wound covered. Keep the wound area clean by washing it with mild soap and water.
