A person in this last stage of dementia requires a significant amount of care. Assistance and supervision is required 24 hours per day. The average rapid onset dementia life expectancy ranges from 3 to 13 years after the onset or diagnosis. However, dementia suffers with rapid onset dementia may deteriorate much faster. Individuals with rapidly progressive dementia have an average life expectancy of 4 to 18 months after the time of diagnosis.

(B) Behavioral and psychological symptoms of dementia (BPSD) are a major source of caregiver burden and a frequent reason for seeking emergency care. Apathy, depression, personality changes, aggression, and resistance to care. Sleep cycle disturbances. Psychotic symptoms (suspicion, paranoia, delusions, hallucinations).
